Chairman's Report 2011 – 2012

The past financial year began with the final preparations for the Welsh Waterways Festival incorporating the IWA National Trail-boat Festival organised by the Trust, Neath Canal Navigation Company and Neath Port Talbot County Borough Council.

The Festival, incorporating the IWA National Trail-boat Festival, was held at Ynysarwed Farm on the 28th to 30th May and proved to be highly successful despite the weather. The IWA event attracted 28 boats from various parts of the UK, some of whom cruised to Neath Town centre. The Trust's trip-boat, Thomas Dadford had a successful 3 days with every trip fully booked. The visiting trip-boat from the Mon. & Brec. Canal also proved to be popular.

The feedback received from the visiting boaters in particular was very favourable, many wishing to return to the canal in future. As a consequence of the Festival and associated funding, a further stretch of the Neath Canal was returned to navigation, an over-bridge was repaired and the canal attracted well-earned publicity.

Details of the events together with an acknowledgement of those who participated and supported the Festival have appeared in the Quarterly Newsletters. The Trust is particularly grateful to members of the three organising bodies, the IWA and to the Mayberry family for their dedication and commitment.

Following the Festival, Thomas Dadford returned to Neath Town Centre to resume its normal duties to and from Tonna Lock – carrying in excess of 500 passengers during the remainder of the season.

Given the vacancy created by the resignation of Peter Ricketts, MBE, as chairman, I was elected as his successor on the Council of Management. Peter, agreed to remain as a director and to accept the post of Archivist and I am grateful to him and other long-standing members of the committee for their support and guidance.

Much of the rest of the year has been taken up with issues relating to improving publicity by commissioning a revised information leaflet on the canals and locating additional signs regarding boat-trips.

Considerable work has also been undertaken at Tonna Workshops, both by work-parties in clearing the garden and burning rubbish and by contractors in rebuilding gate-pillars, hanging new gates, repairing and extending fences and in removing the pallets of lime left over following the restoration of Tonna Lock. As a consequence the overall appearance of the site has been greatly improved, the gates serve to prevent unauthorised access and the new fencing will protect the public from the adjoining river-bank.

On the negative side, part of the wall of the Long Shed collapsed over the winter. Fortunately it comprised the bricked-up portion of one of the original large door openings and did not affect the stone-work. The remainder of the listed building, however, remains precarious and the Trust is actively seeking the involvement of CADW via the local authority to determine the specific requirements for restoration.

The financial position of the Trust is relatively sound at this time and is likely to be augmented by income from the proceeds of the Waterways festival. There is an awareness,

however, of increased costs - such as on fuel and postage - and ways of reducing expenditure are being explored and adopted.

The content and presentation of the web-site is under review and will be updated in due course.

The Trust continues to be represented on various local and national bodies and has sought regular meetings with NPTCBC with a view to being more pro-actively involved in the regeneration of the canals - but with little success to-date.

Finally, I wish to thank those who have served on the Council of Management, manned the trip-boat, attended work-parties and otherwise contributed to the smooth running of the Trust over the past 12 months.

More News.

Thomas Dadford. Another trip boat season has come to an end and as you may well remember, the weather was decidedly wet for much of the time. Volunteer boat crews turned up in all weathers and often spent a lot of time waiting for passengers to arrive or for the rain to stop. Despite the weather, takings for the 2012 season were reasonably good and in fact, were up on last year. Net takings for the season were £1677.59 of which £200 came from booked charters. Despite the ever rising cost of fuel, only £180 was spent on petrol. The season was free from engine and boat problems but weed in the canal caused problems at times despite NCN's efforts to keep the stretch clear. The boat is now out of the water and is resting in the NCN yard. A few small paint jobs will be carried out over the winter months and the engine will receive its annual service.

Tonna Workshops. Vandalism is again a problem at Tonna Workshops and a recent break-in caused damage to one of the doors and locks. Nothing was actually stolen but a new door and locks had to be fitted.

Donation. We are very grateful to Western Power for their recent donation of £600 towards the printing of our new leaflets (one enclosed with this Newsletter)

IWA Calendar. There is a photo of a boat on the Neath Canal in the 2013 IWA (National) Calendar. The boat is one of the visiting boats during the 2011 Welsh Waterways Festival.

Brian was a well informed member of the very first Committee of the Preservation Society formed in 1974. He took on the job of Neath Area Organiser and did much to spread the canal gospel by organising local work parties, looking after all the tools and equipment and together with his wife Pat, was instrumental in making a success of our venture in the early years. Many 'oldies' will remember the various fund raising events held in the Messent's house in Woodlands Park Drive and their informative joint effort – 'Birds of the Neath Canal' – written by Brian and illustrated by Pat – in the early issues of our magazine 'Aqueduct'.

Brian will be sorely missed and remembered as a tall, energetic, hard working person, always full of good ideas, with a ready smile and great sense of humour. Our condolences go to Pat and the rest of the family.

Dave Coles.

It is with sadness I have to report the passing of one of the great characters of our Trust – Dave Coles. He was an Honorary Life Member and always signed himself 'Dave Coles HLM' He moved to this area from Bath, where he grew up. As a youngster he was a member of the Scout Movement and one of his last wishes was to have his ashes scattered on the fields near Bath where he camped as a Boy Scout.

He was a great story teller and loved recalling this tale -

'After the second night of the air raids on Bath, I decided to don my Scout's uniform and volunteer as a bicycle messenger. So, early in the morning of April 23, 1942 I reported to the mayor's office in The Guildhall. On the way, I had to cycle over all the window glass which had been blown out of the houses in Camden Crescent and, to my surprise, did not get a puncture. I was told to stand at the top of the steps and await instructions. As I stood there contemplating the scenes of devastation, a lady came out of the door behind me and we talked for several minutes. She seemed very concerned about me and I did not know who she was until a naval officer emerged with gold rings up to his elbow. They both boarded a car to tour the city.

Thus I met the King and Queen at the age of 13 and remember quite vividly, some 60 years later, the kindness and genuine sympathy she showed to a rather scruffy young boy.'

He never took life too seriously and loved introducing himself to unsuspecting strangers as a fictitious character. During his lifetime he has introduced himself as Lord Bath, a U Boat Commander, a neurosurgeon and a gynaecologist.

He worked for many years at the DVLA in Swansea and wrote a book about the history of the DVLA. Since moving to this area he has always lived near the Neath Canal and loved walking the towpath with his dog. He lived in Neath town centre at first then moved to

Ynysarwed where his garden backed onto the canal. He later moved to Resolven, again within a stones throw of the canal and finally to Glynneath.

He loved his garden and often turned up at AGMs with a small box of fresh raspberries which he presented to the then Chairman, Peter Ricketts – usually after asking some awkward questions about Tonna Workshops!

Dave was a great letter writer and it is said Peter Hain, MP for Neath, has a filing cabinet full of Dave's letters! He also had letters published frequently in local and national publications, usually of a political nature.

His funeral service took place at Margam Crematorium in August and his favourite black cap was placed on his coffin. An announcement was made at the beginning of the service words left on a piece of paper by Dave – 'Anyone showing sadness or grief are not welcome at this service!' In true Dave Cole spirit, the congregation left the service to the music of 'Always Look on the Bright Side of Life' from the film 'Life of Brian'. Our sympathy goes to Dave's sons, daughter and grandchildren.

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New Book.

One of our Life Members, Michael Handford has written a new book – The Cotswold Canals Towpath Guide – The Stroudwater Navigation. The Stroudwater Navigation was a canal linking Stroud to the Severn Estuary near Gloucester. At Wallbridge, near Stroud it connected to the Thames & Severn Canal to form a link between the River Thames and the River Severn. It passed through a total of thirteen locks and was eight miles in length. The canal was opened in 1779 and operated until it was formally abandoned in 1954.

In 2001 the Cotswold Canals Partnership was formed to restore the Stroudwater Navigation from Stonehouse to Stroud.

The author's history of the Stroudwater was first published in the 1970's. This completely revised new edition has been published to reflect the restoration work that has taken plave since then. Complete with 100 B&W illustrations, many of which are published for the first time, this book will bring the restoration story up to date.

The Canal & River Trust.

The Canal & River Trust or as it is known in Wales – Glandwr Cymru, is a charitable trust that was set up to look after waterways in England and Wales. The transfer of ownership from the previous Government-owned operator, British Waterways, took place on the 2nd July 2012. It is expected that inland waterways currently managed by the Environment Agency will transfer to the Trust in 2015. In Scotland British Waterways continues to operate as a stand alone public corporation under the trading name Scottish Canals.

The Motto of the Trust is – 'Keeping People, Nature and History Connected'.

The Trust is responsible for 2000 miles of canals, rivers, docks and reservoirs, along with museums, archives and the country's third largest collection of protected historic buildings.

Both our canals, the Neath and the Tennant, are privately owned so do not come under the umbrella of the Canal & River Trust, but the Swansea Canal and the Mon & Brec. do.

Google has partnered with the Canal & River Trust to put the UK's towpaths on Google Maps. This includes highlighting access points, bridges, locks and tunnels. Once the project is complete, members of the public will have the ability to plan journeys that include canal and river towpaths as well as roads.

Tonna Woodland Walk.

Tonna Community Council has produced a leaflet to guide visitors around their recently completed woodland walk. The partners in the project were the Welsh Assembly Government, Neath Port Talbot C.B.C.. United Nations International Youth Exchange, Tonna Primary Community School, Neath Canal Company and the Neath and Tennant Canals Trust.

The background to the project is – adjacent to the Neath Canal at Aberdulais Basin, there was an area of derelict woodland that once formed part of the Dulais Fach Estate. Several parts of the woodland had become overgrown with rhododendron and the paths were impossible to walk. The woodland project opened up the pathways within the woodland and created a circular walk and a link with the newly restored Neath Canal Towpath. The work was undertaken by a combination of volunteers and specialist contractors.

Access to the woodland is either off Brunel Close or via the Neath Canal Towpath over a wooden bridge upstream, of Aberdulais Basin. Leaflets, which include a map, are available from local Tourist Information Centres.

Lock House, Tonna.

As you may have noticed on the front cover, Lock House alongside the lock in Tonna is for sale. It is owned by Neath Canal Navigation and has been lived in until fairly recently. It is a Grade II Listed Building. Here are the sale details –

About the Property

Of historical interest in the town, a Grade II listed house, believed to have been built in the late 18th Century and extended in the late 19th Century. Adjoining the house is a substantial building which was formerly stables/stores.

The properties require full renovation and interested parties should seek information as to the implications of purchasing a listed building.

The property is situated on the bank of the canal, adjoining the lock which was constructed in 1791.

This is a dream location to live in, and where you can relax and enjoy the rural pleasures of the countryside - otters and kingfishers have recently been sighted at the canal.

Please note access is by private road (public access) from Henfaes Road. Please note there is pedestrian access only from Lock House to Neath and Tonna via the towpath.
